

If you have a loved you would like to add, please give the name, office, or type of duty, along with a picture to the church office. If you prefer not to submit a picture, we can simply post the name.

*A conscientious objector is one who is opposed to serving in the armed forces and/or bearing arms on the grounds of moral or religious principles. Conscientious objectors opposed to serving in the military are still required to register with the Selective Service System and will be placed in the Selective Service Alternative Service Program. Length of service in the program will equal the amount of time a man would have served in the military, usually 24 months.

Mission Moment

Presented by the Missions and Service Commission Highlighting missions that Maple Spring supports



Project Global Village (Proyecto Aldea Global) started its work in 1983 in response to urgent social and economic needs in the rural areas of Honduras. Founded by Chet Thomas (a member of Maple Spring) and Ellsworth Culver, PAG's programs started by focusing on developing a local human infrastructure of communities who would become the future leaders in promoting agricultural, health, and social outreach model programs focusing on family and community development to overcome poverty and injustice. Intertwined throughout PAG's programs is a focus on social justice, and a strong Christian commitment and responsibility to the poor who have no voice.

Starting in 12 villages in Central Honduras, PAG initiated literacy, community health care/child survival, and family-based agricultural development, including food security projects. Later, low-cost housing, installation of community potable water supplies, and cash crop diversification was added. Programming eventually expanded further into micro-credit enterprise development, domestic violence prevention, strengthening of communities and municipal governments, rural road construction, management of watersheds, HIV-AIDS education activities, and public education and agro-industrial development in more than 500 communities located in Western Honduras. This gradual growth and diversification of programming is a direct result of PAG's commitment to a overall approach to development work as opposed to focusing all of its efforts and resources in one area. Having established a lasting presence in some communities for more than three decades, PAG has developed strong relationships and credibility with community leaders and local governments alike. The strong emphasis on local sustainability has produced model programs in community health-care, agro industrial development, micro business development, and credit that has been recognized by world development organizations.


PAG's mission is empowering families to reduce poverty and build just, peaceful, and productive communities based on Christian values. Projects done through PAG must follow development principles and be initiated by local people. Development cannot be given away and implies breaking the cycle of subsistence poverty. Programs should be in harmony with the environment and be self-sustaining over the long term. Also, development is considered incomplete without spiritual renewal.

Resolving the needs of the very poor in Honduras has been PAG'S highest priority since 1984. They have seen positive changes in families and communities. PAG is supported by grants and donations from international development agencies, international charitable foundations, churches, and thousands of individuals. They are thankful to God and to their committed donors and friends for the support and faithful prayers over these many years.
